## CHAMPION FOR CHILDREN



Special thank you to the Children's Centre Thunder Bay for allocating \$50,000 to our agency as a one time support for children and youth in our community. This funding was used to help mitigate risk and reduce the likelihood of admission to agency care. Supports include food, payment of essential bills, transportation costs, clothing and the purchase of household items. Furthermore, this funding has assisted with payment of alternate living arrangements where the pandemic has impacted the caregivers current living situation.

The Children's Centre Thunder Bay received this one-time funding through the province's COVID-19 preparedness plan, Keeping Ontarians Safe: Preparing for Future Waves of COVID-19, which was meant to help the province quickly identify, prevent and respond to any scenario in order to protect communities.

This funding has truly made a difference in the lives of our families, youth and children in ways that would otherwise not have been possible.

The Children's Aid Society of the District of Thunder Bay thanks the Children's Centre Thunder Bay and honors them as Champions for Children.

## HOLIDAY HAMPER PROGRAM

The Holiday Hamper Program provides support in the form of toys, clothing and food to those supported by the Children's Aid Society of the District of Thunder Bay. This program has been in operation for the past 38 years, the last 20 in conjunction with Walmart. Each year, community members can select a snowman with a child or youth's name and can shop for holiday gifts. In 2020, close to 400 snowman were handpicked through this program. We are so thankful for continued support offered by our friends at Walmart.





## Post Secondary Advocacy



The Children's Aid Society of the District of Thunder Bay continued to advocate to ensure every youth has a bright future. Confederation College joined the list of post secondary institutions that will ensure finances are not a barrier to post-secondary studies for children and youth who grew up in the care system.

## One Vision One Voice Training



The Children's Aid Society of the District of Thunder Bay participated in One Vision One Voice training. This Practice Framework supports child welfare agencies in providing better service to African Canadian children, youth, and families as the data shows over-representation and disparity of outcomes for African Canadian children, youth, and families

## **Equity in Child Welfare Training**



The Children's Aid Society of the District of Thunder Bay underwent an intensive three day equity training. This training aims to expand participants' knowledge and understanding of equity issues in the Ontario child welfare system. The curriculum supports the development of equity practice skills to address systemic issues of racism and oppression, which cause disparity of service for marginalized communities and lead to the overrepresentation of Indigenous and African Canadian children, youth, and families in the child welfare system.

## Child Welfare Redesign



In July 2020, the Ontario government announced the modernization of the child welfare system. The redesign ensures more families stay together and that children and youth in care have the support they need to be safe, succeed and thrive.

The strategy focuses on transforming child and family services to strengthen families and communities through: prevention; early intervention and finding more permanent homes for children and youth in care when they cannot stay in their own homes or communities.
